Eamonn McCabe A talk in association with Norwich 20 Group

Eamonn started off photographing for local papers before freelancing for the *Guardian* and other national titles. In 1976 he joined the *Observer* and won Sports Photographer of The Year a record four times, covering three Olympics. Eamonn was named News Photographer of the Year for his work at the Heysel Stadium disaster. He is a Fellow in Photography at the National Museum of Film, Photography and Television. Later becoming the *Guardian* Picture Editor, he won Picture Editor of the Year a record six times. In 2001 Eamonn returned to freelancing, photographing mainly people in the arts for the *Guardian* but also other newspapers and magazines.

Bruce Lacey

A talk by Lynda Morris and Krzysztof Fijalkowski to mark the anniversary of Bruce's death in 2015

Bruce Lacey was a multifaceted artist, performer and eccentric. After completing his national service in the Navy, Bruce became established on the avantgarde art scene with his performance art and mechanical constructs.

Bruce came to Norfolk in the 1970s. His robot *Miss Rosa Bosom* won the 1985 Alternative Miss World and kissed customers at the NUA exhibition. The Tate bought his 1966 robot *Womanizer*, the year after it was included in *Things* 2000 at NUA.

Lynda and Krzysztof both knew Bruce well. They are both professors at NUA and worked together at the Norwich Gallery at the turn of the Millennium.

Militarized Landscape A talk by artist Rosie Snell

For a long time Rosie has held a fascination for militarized landscapes, particularly that strange counterpoint when Brutalist architecture and machinery meets the English countryside. She moved to Norwich to do an MA at NUA in 1994, and after living in Norfolk for several years became accustomed to encountering military machinery at the American airbases, surreally juxtaposed with the ploughed fields and cabbage crops of the Norfolk countryside. These striking visual counterpoints led Rosie to research, through her practice, how conflicts and technological developments have not only created purpose-built machines but have also had a direct effect on the landscape.
