	Devising and exploring playing techniques (and, in the case of percussion, instrumental setups) particularly sensitive to rapidity and density of action (i.e. different levels of density/rapidity result in divergent sonic outputs from the same technique).
Aug – Sep 2014	Preliminary Composition Process
	Development of computer-controlled click-track, which constantly changes speed in real time according to statistically controlled parameters. Creation of first draft of score.
Nov 2014	Workshop with Scapegoat Duo
	Testing and refinement of computer-controlled click track software (written by the composer in Max MSP), especially with regard to governing parametric limits and statistically controlled behavior of the changing click-track.
